It's time to get an idea of **How You Scout**. One copy of the **How Do You Scout** survey should be done by each family. It is best to have as many members of the family present as possible so that you capture everyone's perspective. You may even find during this process that members of your own family have different feelings about how they would like to participate in Scouting.

The following questions ask you about your attitudes concerning some key areas of differences that occur in a Scouting unit.

To complete the survey:

1. Circle the letter for the response that best describes the current state of the unit.
2. Put an X on the letter for the response which best describes how your family would like to participate in Scouting if it were up to you.
3. In the box to the left of the ABCD, write the number of letters that your X is away from your O.
4. Circle YES if it would be hard for your family to align with any view other than the option selected. Otherwise, circle NO.

If your total score is a 0...

Wow! Congratulations! Your Scouting unit seems to have been built for your family. If you're one of these lucky Scouting families, let us know how you discovered the "secret ingredient" to your unit's harmony.

If your total score is a 1 to 3...

There are a few areas where you may prefer to do things a bit differently, but these differences are very slight and should be easily overcome. Just remember—communication is key! Consider chatting with other parents and your unit leader about their preferences to see if you can agree on some small changes that may make everyone's Scouting experience EVEN BETTER!

If your total score is a 4 to 8...

While you generally agree with the way things are done in your unit, there are some things your family would really like to do differently. It's completely normal to have disagreements from time to time, and your perspective offers value on how the unit can best serve families. Consider voicing your thoughts in a constructive manner. You may find that others may feel the same way or that accommodations can be made so you can enjoy the program even more!

If your total score is a 9 to 12...

Your family's Scouting style differs significantly from how your unit is run. Belonging to a unit that compliments your family's preferences allows you to get the most value out of Scouting. This is a good time to reflect on your answers from the survey and discuss all of your options with your unit leader and fellow parents. Whether you decide to stay with your current unit, join a different unit in your area, or start a new one, opening up the conversation is the first step to living your best Scouting life.

If your total score is a 13 and over ...

The Scouting experience you're looking for is worlds away from how your current unit operates. These differences, and how strongly you feel about them, could be a sign that your unit may not be the right fit for your family. Don't be discouraged. Keep an open mind toward other units (there are tons of great ones to choose from!) and look for other families that like to Scout the way you do. The ideal unit might be around the corner or it could be one you create yourself. Your unit leaders and local Scouting council are there to help. Together, you'll be able to find the right fit for your family.
