Program and Schedule

The Camporee is going to have more of a Jamboree feel to it than a traditional Camporee. Scouts will still have the opportunity to compete in some activities that one would see at a camporee, but we will have 6 different program areas that you can choose what you would like to participate in. These areas are going to be staffed by Scouts and Scouters, as well as experts in each of the field.

1. Sustainability
 - Our sustainability area will use adventure and hands on learning to explore the environment and our impact on the environment around us. Scouts will get to work directly on alternative energy sources, wildlife management, how to create a sustainable community, and the 3-Rs.
2. STEM
 - You will see camp in a whole new way when you start to investigate the “why and how” behind camp. Scouts will explore cutting edge scientific principles, while also getting to learn the science behind programs such as blacksmithing, archery, and climbing.
3. Shooting Sports
 - Come to the shooting sports area to get to shoot traditional activities like rifle, shotgun, and archery. Stay longer and work on your marksmanship program. Ready for the next level- take part in the biathlon. A combination of speed and accuracy.
4. Aquatics
 - Participants will have the opportunity to canoe, row, and kayak around the pond. Want to try something different, take out one of the paddleboards or round boards.
5. Scout Skills
 - It would not be a camporee, without scout skills. Test your knowledge with knots, lashings, orienteering, and geocaching. Come ready to try something new to eat in our outdoor cooking area. Perhaps you want to see how high you can climb in the climbing area.
6. Emergency Prep
 - The motto of the Scouts is “Be Prepared” and this area will help you in your preparation. Activities in be interactive and hands on, where you learn and participate in emergency preparedness drills and activities.

Plus we will have some traditional camporee activities spread out for patrols to take part in.

Lodging

Staff Housing

Staff will be given the option of either staying in cabins or in campsites. All youth staff must stay with their unit and are not allowed to tent without adult supervision. OA will have a dedicated campsite on location.

District

Each district will be assigned a subcamp buddy. Out of Council units will be mixed in with districts to make the size of the campsite more evenly distributed. Campsite assignments will be made

Unit

Each unit will be assigned a campsite based on which district they are a member of.

Dining

Units are responsible for all meals except for dinner Sunday night. We strongly encourage units to have a quick meal on Sunday for lunch to be able to take of the program opportunities throughout the day.

Dinner Sunday night will be a traditional cookout, with hamburgers, hotdogs, and sides. Vegetarian options will be available.

Any food allergies need to be identified and reported by Oct. 1st.

Troop and Personal Gear

The BSA health history is required for all participants and should remain in the possession on the Troop. Parts A and B are required for this weekend. A physical exam is not required.

Troop Gear

When planning on Troop gear, please be advised that no unit will be allowed to bring their vehicle to their campsite. Each unit will be assigned to a subcamp. Units staying in Subcamp B and C, will have their gear brought to and dropped at their campsite. Subcamp A will be required to carry their gear to the site.

Campsites do not have any shelter. Please come prepared for all weather!

Personal Gear

Along with traditional gear that you plan, be sure to bring a swimsuit if you are planning on doing aquatics, a water bottle, bug spray, and a flashlight!
