To develop youth, their families, and by extension, our communities in preparedness for health and safety in the event of personal emergencies or community disasters through evidence-based scouting activities, FEMA resources, and in collaboration with local preparedness partners.

Background to Ready Cub! . . .

After all of us experiencing firsthand the effects of a pandemic together with climate change, inflation, domestic political discord and geopolitical tensions, it feels more relevant than in generations to come together as a community to increase our preparedness for health and safety in the event of personal emergencies or community disasters.

The Purpose of Ready Cub! . . .

The goal of Ready Cub! is to enrich the existing Cub Scout adventures with resources from external partners like the Federal Emergency Management Agency & the Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency (FEMA/MEMA) and first responders. At the same time Ready Cub! also seeks to strengthen community ties; between individuals, families and community partners such as first responders, schools etc.

FEMA/MEMA & Cub Scouting. . .

The Spirit of Adventure Council is actively working with FEMA/MEMA to bring together youth interested in supporting disaster preparedness and making a difference in their communities by completing disaster preparedness projects. This Ready Cub! material uses FEMA educational tools such as <u>STEP (Student Tools for Emergency Planning)</u> and more to boost/enrich some of the Cub Scouts' requirements related to emergency readiness.

How to get Started on Ready Cub! . . .

Getting started on Ready Cub! is easy. There are three "levels" to the program: What you can do in the Den, Pack and for the Community. There is something there for everyone, the youths, their families, den leaders, cubmaster etc. In this Ready Cub! material you can quickly navigate the requirements for your den/pack and see how the Ready Cub! activities can fill in a portion of your annual pack program while attracting new youth and engaging community partners.

To Earn the Ready Cub! Patch review and complete the following:

- 1. The selected Requirements from the Cub Scout handbooks by Rank and complete these together with the Ready Cub! Booster for each Rank.
- 2. Pack level requirements are specified in the section about "Earning The Patch / Pack Recognition"

Ready Cub! – Strengthen Your Community

Scouting relies on community partnerships to provide opportunities for our youth to learn and grow. Community partners are sought to provide leadership, materials, and programming to encourage youth participation. Our partnership with Federal Emergency Management Agency & the Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency (FEMA/MEMA) creates an umbrella environment to set the stage for deeper and local first responders and schools partnership by our local scout units. Read more below how your Pack can reach out to first responders and schools to create a better and stronger community together.

First Responders & Cub Scouting. . .

Community first responders are sought to provide leadership, subject expertise, and inspiration to encourage youth participation and interest in emergency preparedness on a local level. Every rank in Cub Scouting (5-10 years) has a requirement to talk to or visit their local fire, police or EMS station and virtually all kids love that element of their adventure! First responders have for years readily welcomed visits by our Cub Scouts and by actively planning for regular yearly visits on a community level of Cub Scout units (i.e. Packs) together we could more consistently and holistically make our brave community first responders available to more youth, both Cub Scouts and non-scouts. We invite any first responder to study our Ready Cub! material to learn about our deep commitment to emergency preparedness and respect for our first responders' great service to our community.

Building Partnership with First responders in Your Community

Every rank in cub scouting has a requirement to talk to or visit their local fire, police or EMS station and virtually all kids love that element of their adventure. Reciprocating your visit by offering them a clean-up project of their choice (any community place) accomplish another requirement in every rank by completing a service project.

- 1 Invite to talks with the Chief of local community fire-,police- and EMS departments.
- 2 Present and give them the Ready Cub! material. This material will present how cub scouts are trained in emergency preparedness from the age of 5 to 10.

Ask if you can set up for a month every year where cub scouts can come and visit each of the three branches of first responders. This can start with a single Pack starting this adventure and then inviting other Packs in the community or you do it all together. Important is to get it going and adopt it as more units join.

Example

- Lion & Tiger Visit the fire station in September
- Wolf & Bear Visit the police station in October
- Webelos & AOL Visit the EMS first responders in November

Please note that October 28 is National First Responders Day which recognizes the heroic men and women who make it their business to take immediate action when disaster strikes.

- 4 Ask for how many people can join any event. Let the Scouts in the involved units have the first chance to sign up for participation.
- 5 After a certain time window please open up the remaining slots for any non-scout youth of cub scout age to join this event/bring a friend. This is a great recruitment opportunity for your Pack! Work with school superintendents/principals if they can send out a link for signing up to these visits.
- 6 Start every first responder visit with an adult or youth leader thanking and introducing the first responders on behalf of the units involved and make sure to welcome any non-scouts in the audience; and ask them to come and see you if they like to know more about Cub Scouting in town.
- 7 Ask the Chief if the Pack(s) could reciprocate their kind invite by asking parents to bring food/snacks/drinks that the first responders like. Make sure that you use a tool like SignUpGenius to get the best mix of things. Other ways to contribute back is to a clean-up project of their choice (any community place), have the cubs write Thank You cards etc. All dens have community service to achieve every year.
- 8 Please have a designated person in charge for the upkeep of the relationship (feedback, booking next year visit etc.)

Is There a First Responder Day in Your Community?

National First Responders Day on October 28 recognizes the heroic men and women who make it their business to take immediate action when disaster strikes. Congress designated October 28th as National First Responders Day in 2017. The resolution honors the firefighters, police officers, EMTs, and all those who are first on the scene in stressful situations.

- 1 If there is one ask to join based on the Ready Cub material and be ready to set up a presence on this day and showcase how Cub Scouts are trained in emergency preparedness. Your presence will show support to first responders and will also be a great recruitment opportunity.
- 2 If there is nothing of its kind in your community, don't be afraid to explore. Establishing a partnership with first responders might be the right triggering event for setting one up to show your support? Maybe such an event could join a local town fair already existing?
- 3 All units, Packs, Troops, and Crews, could join for this event highlighting what Scouting is doing in emergency preparedness.
 - Each unit talks about what they do for Emergency & Preparedness
 - HAM Radio
 - Sell First Aid Kit

Elementary Schools & Cub Scouting. . .

We would like to make our Ready Cub! program available to all of our youth whether they are Cub Scouts or not. We are therefore also inviting non-scout youth to access our program in elementary school presentations by our trained leaders presenting age-appropriate FEMA educational material on emergency preparedness. Please study this Ready Cub! material to further understand how we could contribute in this field. We would also like to invite elementary school youth to our first responder visits on a first come, first serve basis.

Teachers don't need "extra" activities in an overcrowded curriculum. The FEMA curriculum is very flexible to be stand alone or to fit into many existing elementary curricula. For example, it can be connected to an upcoming disaster season: tropical storm/hurricane-, snow season, etc. It can also be integrated into science and social sciences to provide context as to why and what we know about earthquakes, hurricanes, precipitation, flooding etc.

For schools that seek to provide leadership in their community, accessing and sponsoring these programs during after-school program, clubs, or at the beginning or the end of the school year etc. can develop positive relationships between families, community partners, and schools.

Opportunity to Talk About Emergency Preparedness in Schools

- 1 Invite to talks with the school superintendent in town or the principals at elementary schools
- 2 Present and give them the Ready Cub! & School presentation material. This material will present how cub scouts are trained in emergency preparedness from the age of 5 to 10.
- 3 Ask if they would like to participate in
 - a. Inviting elementary school youth to our first responder visits on a first come, first serve basis.
 - Giving non-scout youth to access our program in elementary school presentations by our trained leaders presenting ageappropriate FEMA educational material on emergency preparedness.
- 4 Please ask them when a visit by us would be most beneficial to them:
 - a. Linked to the season: tropical storm/hurricane-, snow season
 - b. After School program
 - c. Right before the end of school year
 - d. September is National Preparedness Month
 - e. National First Responders Day on October 28

National Events & Cub Scouting

Down below are two highly relevant national events related to emergency preparedness and should present your Pack with great opportunities to be an active participant together with other parties in your town.

National Preparedness Month - September

September is National Preparedness Month, a time to raise awareness about the importance of preparing for disasters and emergencies that could happen at any time — with or without warning.

For many Packs, their first Pack meeting of the new Scout year is in September. It is an excellent opportunity to observe National Preparedness Month by practicing an emergency procedure/ drill while at a Pack meeting. While doing this the Pack is earning one of the requirements for the Ready Cub! Patch.

National First Responders Day - October 28

National First Responders Day on October 28 recognizes the heroic men and women who make it their business to take immediate action when disaster strikes. Congress designated October 28th as National First Responders Day in 2017. The resolution honors the firefighters, police officers, EMTs, and all those who are first on the scene in stressful situations.

It is an excellent service project for Packs as a whole to see how they can honor their communities' first responders on National First Responders Day. Read more about this in the section Ready Cub! – Build Partnerships.
